

Lake Toxarvay United Methodist Church Sunday, November 15th, 2020

Dear Lake Toxaway UMC family and friends,

When I read scripture, I am comforted, challenged, changed, corrected, guided. These are only a few of the verbs that describe how scripture works in the lives of God's people. The Gospel lesson is so familiar to us, so I invite you to take another look.

The Greek word translated, talent, is a word that indicates a large sum of money: fifteen years of wages. This is almost an unthinkable sum of money and difficult to translate into modern terms. If you worked at your job for fifteen years and retained all of your income, you would have a talent. If you earned \$100,000/year, a talent would equal 1.5 million dollars. Jesus tells the story with almost no details in its beginning other than "a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them: one 7.5 million, another 3 million, and a third 1.5 million.

Then the story continues with the choices each servant made with the money entrusted to them. The first two servants double the investments. The third guards the money carefully and retains the original amount. Then the master returns after a long time away and there is a settlement of accounts.

I want to point out a few things which I often overlook. The money was distributed to each slave according to ability (English translation); the Greek word is better translated power. As it comes to the third slave, I remind us a first-century Jew would have considered collecting interest as illegal; this was the sin of usury.

So... I find myself focused on this third servant and asking what Jesus was saving about the one-talent servant. I find the master's statement about this third servant and the judgment harsh just as the servant had described the master. Is there a hint to look again at the story?

Remember, Christians do not enter into a joy of material abundance; we know this does not bring real and lasting joy. Entering into the joy of the Christ we follow is different from the joy that surrounds us: amassing stuff, getting ahead, striving to be number one. Our joy is rooted in the hope of a God who loved us so much that Jesus, His only Son, came for us.

Perhaps Jesus is setting up his listeners to the story that comes next in Matthew's gospel where the sheep and goats are separated based on unrecognized generosity. Perhaps Jesus really wants to contrast the difference between managing talents and giving away talents. Perhaps the challenge is to hear this story as troubling and to recognize God's work in the world is one of casting grace generously in order to seek all to come to Christ.

I have not completed the sermon yet, so I cannot tell you my conclusion. I hope you are wrestling with me in this preparation. I trust the Holy Spirit to speak to you and guide you in applying this lesson.

I know you as a people to be generous and loving. May we continue to live in this joy, the joy of Jesus!

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Judges 4:1-7

- 4:1 The Israelites again did what was evil in the sight of the LORD, after Ehud died.
- 4:2 So, the LORD sold them into the hand of King Jabin of Canaan, who reigned in Hazor; the commander of his army was Sisera, who lived in Harosheth-ha-goiim.
- 4:3 Then the Israelites cried out to the LORD for help; for he had nine hundred chariots of iron, and had oppressed the Israelites cruelly twenty years.
- 4:4 At that time Deborah, a prophetess, wife of Lappidoth, was judging Israel.
- 4:5 She used to sit under the palm of Deborah between Ramah and Bethel in the hill country of Ephraim; and the Israelites came up to her for judgment.
- 4:6 She sent and summoned Barak son of Abinoam from Kedesh in Naphtali, and said to him, "The LORD, the God of Israel, commands you, 'Go, take position at Mount Tabor, bringing ten thousand from the tribe of Naphtali and the tribe of Zebulun.
- 4:7 I will draw out Sisera, the general of Jabin's army, to meet you by the Wadi Kishon with his chariots and his troops; and I will give him into your hand."

Psalm 123 (read responsively the text in bold)

- 123:1 To you I lift up my eyes, O you who are enthroned in the heavens!
- 123:2 As the eyes of servants look to the hand of their master, as the eyes of a maid to the hand of her mistress, so our eyes look to the LORD our God, until he has mercy upon us.
- Have mercy upon us, O LORD, have mercy upon us, for we have had more than enough of contempt.
- 123:4 Our soul has had more than its fill of the scorn of those who are at ease, of the contempt of the proud.

1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

- 5:1 Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you.
- For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night.
- 5:3 When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape!
- 5:4 But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief;
- 5:5 for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness.

- 5:6 So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober;
- 5:7 for those who sleep Jobin's at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night.
- 5:8 But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation.
- 5:9 For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ,
- 5:10 who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him.
- 5:11 Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

Matthew 25:14-30

- 25:14 "For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them;
- to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away.
- 25:16 The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents.
- 25:17 In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents.
- 25:18 But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.
- 25:19 After a long time, the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them.
- Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.'
- 25:21 His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.'
- 25:22 And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.'
- 25:23 His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.'
- Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed;
- 25:25 so, I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.'

- 25:26 But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter?
- Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return, I would have received what was my own with interest.
- 25:28 So, take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents.
- For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away.
- As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

L: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

P: Thanks be to God!

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor. (Let us offer our silent confessions.)

We are "pack rats", O Lord. You continually pour gifts and blessings into our lives and we hide them away for fear that they might disappear or not be worthy of acclaim. We squander them wastefully on things that are not healthy or helpful to others. We confess that we have not always recognized the talents we have been given. We find it easier to belittle the gifts than to honor the giver. As Jesus reminded his listeners to honor the giver of the gifts by using them to create something better, for healing, for hope in the world; remind us that the message of Jesus is truly pertinent to us today. Forgive us when we have treated it as a nice story. Help us to take the gifts you have given us, to develop them, and use them in ways which will offer healing and hope. In Jesus' blessed Name, we pray. AMEN.

You are loved by God and given so many gifts to be used to help others. Do not fear to use these gifts, for God is with you, continually blessing you and the gifts in your service. AMEN.


