Dear Lake Toxaway family and friends,

I spiritually need the season of Advent, especially in this year, 2020, marked by a pandemic, division, and uncertainty! Waiting has become a familiar practice to all of us in this year. I confess I am not one who likes to wait for anything, especially things beyond my control; therefore, I can move to despair, despondency, complacency and inactivity.

This is precisely why I need Advent. I need a "swift kick" to get the new liturgical year started, so the season begins with a call to get ready. I confess I have struggled in this year to remember there is something for which to prepare. Since I am being so honest this week, I'll share how I often prepare during Advent for a historical observance of what God did at one time. I am grateful for it, defined by it. But it is to an extent, old news. It can become a case of "been there, done that," but I know the Holy Spirit invites us to a different and fresh preparation.

What is it we are waiting for? The first reading reminds us we what we long for is not a historical remembrance but a new reality, a new encounter. And this new encounter can be shocking; it can wake us up from overlooking what really surrounds us.

We all remember being sent to clean our room. And we remember the first thought as we stumbled through the door and flopped onto the bed: "Looks clean to me!" Right? I could overlook the mess or shove it under a bed in a few minutes.

The prophet Isaiah comes along to invite us to take another look at our living space. The prophet stands at the door and tells us company is coming. He tells us to take another look around and ask what would happen if the company were to break through our door right now.

That is the task of Advent, to pay attention to what is and what might be, not simply to look back at what was. The people of God were in exile; the foundations of their nation had been shaken; the comforts they had taken for granted had been taken from them. The human institutions they had constructed no longer held the security they once knew. They looked elsewhere; they realized their faith was shaky as well. They needed encouragement, so they looked back. They also looked forward. The mountains of their society were shaken. The people of God needed an Advent "upside the head!"

Advent is a reminder to get out of our sense of complacency. During this difficult time of worldwide challenge, we need Advent as prayer, as a reminder to hope!

That is the call of Jesus in our Gospel passage this week. We sometimes must listen hard to hear something hopeful in these descriptions, but it is there! Rather than reading Jesus' words and becoming nervous, we can hear the promise the Master is near: not as a threat but as a promise! Life in all of its joy and promise is coming as promised!

And we forget every now and then. We forget we are looking for anything, hoping for anything. Until Advent comes and "knocks us upside the head" with a not-so subtle reminder. Then we look and see how complacent we have become in our comfortableness, our struggles of waiting in a pandemic, our indifference or anger with the divisions in our society. Then we see what a mess our rooms are, and how we need to do something about it because "Company is coming!"

Let us prepare spiritually to be awakened, restored, and enlivened as the bold people of God who hold the love of Christ in our hearts and community!

Lighting the Advent Wreath

Reader #1: The prophet cries to God, "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence... so that the nations might tremble at your presence!" (Isaiah 64:1, 2b)

Reader #2: As people of faith, we wait for God's breakthrough, that moment when God will come to us and to our world, that time when the light of God will cut through the darkness.

Reader #1: As dark as it may seem, the promise of our faith is that God will surely come.

Reader #2: We join together in lighting the first Advent candle. May the children of Bethlehem of Rosman, Lake Toxaway, Sapphire, Balsam Grove, and of the whole world experience God's living hope as we journey on this advent road. (light one purple candle)

Let us pray:

O God, we have looked for you in the heavens, listened for you in the howling winds

and in the quaking mountains. But we now know that you will be found among us.

We will not see you in the glitter of a mall, but in a shelter of the homeless. We will not hear you in the pitch of a commercial, but in the whimper of a child.

You will come, not in the comforts of the privileged, but swaddled in the needs of the neglected. Open our eyes to your coming, let us see the glory of angels, hear the testimony of shepherds, and ponder the secrets of Mary, so that we might proclaim together that you are coming. We look to you in faithful hope. Amen.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Isaiah 64:1-9

- 64:1 O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence--
- 64:2 as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil-- to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence!
- 64:3 When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.

- 64:4 From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him.
- 64:5 You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed.
- 64:6 We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.
- 64:7 There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.
- 64:8 Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand.
- 64:9 Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people.

Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19 (Please read responsively the text in bold)

- 80:1 Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, you who lead Joseph like a flock! You who are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine forth
- 80:2 before Ephraim and Benjamin and Manasseh. Stir up your might, and come to save us!
- 80:3 Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved.
- 80:4 O LORD God of hosts, how long will you be angry with your people's prayers?
- 80:5 You have fed them with the bread of tears, and given them tears to drink in full measure.
- 80:6 You make us the scorn of our neighbors; our enemies laugh among themselves.
- 80:7 Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved.
- 80:17 But let your hand be upon the one at your right hand, the one whom you made strong for yourself.
- 80:18 Then we will never turn back from you; give us life, and we will call on your name.
- 80:19 Restore us, O LORD God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved.

1 Corinthians 1:3-9

- 1:3 Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.
- 1:4 I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus,
- 1:5 for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind--
- 1:6 just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you--
- 1:7 so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ.

- 1:8 He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 1:9 God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Mark 13:24-37 (Please stand)

- 13:24 "But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light,
- 13:25 and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.
- 13:26 Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory.
- 13:27 Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.
- 13:28 "From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near.
- 13:29 So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates.
- 13:30 Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place.
- 13:31 Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.
- 13:32 "But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father.
- 13:33 Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come.
- 13:34 It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch.
- 13:35 Therefore, keep awake--for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn,
- 13:36 or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly.
- 13:37 And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."
- L: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

P: Thanks be to God!

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor. (Let us offer our silent confessions.)

Patient, everlasting source of life, we know that you are present with those who gladly do what's right; we know that you remember those who remember you; we know that your judgment is just. STATEMENT OF FAITH (The Apostles' Creed)
