Dear Lake Toxaway family and community,

Last week I wrote about seeing the mess and cleaning it up. And this week, I write about decorating. We need to make the place look great for the One who is coming and for the persons Christ came to find, to heal, to love, to forgive and to redeem in the ever open and expanding community He created.

For many people, this year of 2020 has been a time of desperation, loneliness, disappointment, anxiety, and uncertainty. While some of us may have been isolated from some of these challenges, we all have felt the challenges of separation. Isaiah understood desperation and separation. This book in the Bible has at least two tones: the first half refers to a time when things were going well for the people as a nation and was a mode of warning and judgment. The second half of the book speaks to a desperate people who have lost many things, who are hungry and afraid and displaced.

This second part of Isaiah shifts to words of hope and promise. There is a call to live, even in desperate times, by a different standard. (Read Isaiah 61:1-4). Things are bad and the prophet comes to the people and brings Good News! And they are promised garlands, oil and a mantle.

God comes to people who are desperate and tells them to decorate! It may seem "out of sync." Decorations are nice and all, but they hardly serve to make things better. They cannot be counted as change agents in the world. Right? Why do we bother? Are we holding on to sentimentality or even worse, shouting in the dark?

In a way, yes, we are shouting in the darkness; it is a noble profession, a calling. When we shout, when we decorate our homes and our church, we are not saying we are unaware of the difficulties, oblivious to bad news; we are saying we chose to live by hope and joy in Jesus rather than despair.

And this is not looking from a rose-colored glass scenario; it is looking through the prophetic call to act in hope. and joy. We are called to work (to decorate) because we have hope and we are blessed with a secure future beyond earthly imagination.

Because we hope in joy, we are blessed. John's Gospel calls us to hope also. John reminds us he is not the Messiah; he is the one getting the halls ready with garland, oil and water. We are preparing space, partly with decorations, yes, but mostly with acts of love and service. We practice for receiving the Savior by receiving the one the Savior saved. We don't wait for the return of Christ by excluding others. We acknowledge them as a part of the company for who we wait.

May our decorations in our homes and in our little church be lights in the darkness that point to Christ. I pray we are sharing the light more this year than in previous years even as we wrestle with the creative ways to do this in worship. I am grieving the loss of a full church on Christmas Eve where we light candles from the Christ Candle and sing in the glow of His light.

Let's finish our decorations! We await the angels' proclamation of good news and peace on earth!

Lighting the Advent Wreath

Reader 1: The voice of John the Baptist proclaims that we should prepare for the coming of the Lord, the one who will bring good news to the oppressed, bind up the brokenhearted, and proclaim liberty to the captives; the one who will build up and repair what has been broken and clothe us in salvation; the one who will bring light and joy back to the desolate places.

Reader 2: One thing we have seen over and over again: our ways have not worked. Our best efforts are, at worst, destructive and at best, only a glimmer of what God has to offer. We cannot thrive in our own light. In faith, we look for the light of God.

Reader 1: On our Advent journey, we have seen signs of God's light. We light one candle for signs of hope. (Light one blue candle).

Reader 2: We light one candle for signs of peace. (Light 2nd blue candle.)

Reader 1: Today we light the third Advent candle, the pink candle, the candle of joy and we draw closer to the pure light of God that will bring true joy to our lives. (Light the pink candle.)

Let us pray:

With laughing hearts and joyous hope, we come to you, O God. With tired souls and withered dreams, we come to you, O God. In our joy and in our sorrow, we look to you, O God. Renew us with your love. Gather us into your strong embrace, that we may know your presence and rejoice in your promised coming. We pray with hopeful expectation. Amen.

SCRIPTURE READINGS

<u>Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11</u>

- The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners;
- to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn;
- to provide for those who mourn in Zion-- to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, to display his glory.

- They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.
- 61:8 For I the LORD love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them.
- Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the LORD has blessed.
- 61:10 I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels.
- 61:11 For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord GOD will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

Psalm 126 (Please read responsively the text in bold)

- 126:1 When the LORD restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream.
- 126:2 Then our mouth was filled with laughter, and our tongue with shouts of joy; then it was said among the nations, "The LORD has done great things for them."
- 126:3 The LORD has done great things for us, and we rejoiced.
- 126:4 Restore our fortunes, O LORD, like the watercourses in the Negeb.
- 126:5 May those who sow in tears reap with shouts of joy.
- 126:6 Those who go out weeping, bearing the seed for sowing, shall come home with shouts of joy, carrying their sheaves.

1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

- 5:16 Rejoice always,

- 1:21 And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No."
- 1:22 Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?"
- 1:23 He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,'" as the prophet Isaiah said.
- 1:24 Now they had been sent from the Pharisees.
- 1:25 They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?"
- 1:26 John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know,
- 1:27 the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal."
- 1:28 This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

- P: Thanks be to God!
