Dear Lake Toxaway UMC family and friends,

Today's Scripture readings have a big fish story (yes, I know a whale is a mammal, but bear with me) and a call to professional fisherman to become "fishers of men!" I cherish both of these call stories. The contrast of an Old Testament story is the reluctance of Jonah to follow the call with the Gospel lesson where Simon and Andrew immediately respond to Jesus' call. I have found myself in both places in my journey to follow Jesus, and I suspect you have too.

I want you to imagine Jesus' call not as a simplistic "rounding up for Jesus." I want you to hear the call to make human connections, to recognize the interwoven nature of our interrelationships of influences and support. Can we imagine casting the net wide enough to include acceptance and hospitality, invitation and engagement? Following Jesus is not simply about a state of being but a call to doing! If we follow Jesus, we will find ourselves busy in God's work, bubbling with a desire to connect, to share, to gather. Follow Jesus and we are never alone again!

So, this week I am asking many of you to step out, listen to a call to write personal devotionals and to agree to publish those on our website as a way of engaging each other and the larger community. (Read the announcement with the bulletin, please!)

I am suggesting the following format: 1) include some Bible verses (you can choose them or we can assign them; the verses can simply be a reference to the passage such as Philippians 4: 4-7 and highlight a singular verse that speaks to you). 2)Provide a short story or commentary on the verses. Share a story from your life where you have applied one of the particular themes in the verses (from the above passage in Philippians, I would choose the theme of letting my gentleness be known and tell a story where I found being gentle a powerful spiritual recognition with some brief details. Whatever theme you decide is speaking to you, stick with it in the devotional. The devotional will be much more powerful if you keep it personal rather than focusing on a historic person or attempting to be something/somebody you are not. 3) Finally, write a brief prayer to conclude the devotional. The prayer should attempt to pull the devotional into a concise focus. And many of you are asking about length: concise is best but many, like I, will be wordy. Don't focus so much on the length, but I suggest 50 to 150 and no more than 175 words.

I am gently casting a net with a prayerful request for volunteers. We need to hear from each other! You hear too much from me. I want to learn where you are growing more in love with God and walking closer with Christ Jesus. I want to hear where your "rough edges" are (You hear about mine frequently). Most of all, I want us to be The Church even in a time of Social Isolation! Please prayerfully consider this request and hear it as a call to follow Jesus.

I express appreciation to those who have prayed with me about this idea and to Nancee Salyer and Scott Walter for coordinating this Faith Formation endeavor.

SCRIPTURE READINGS - Third Sunday after the Epiphany

Jonah 3:1-5, 10

- 3:1 The word of the LORD came to Jonah a second time, saying,
- "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you."
- 3:3 So, Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the LORD. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across.
- Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!"

- 3:5 And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth.
- 3:10 When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Psalm 62:5-12 (Please read responsively the text in bold)

- 62:5 For God alone my soul waits in silence, for my hope is from him.
- 62:6 He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken.
- On God rests my deliverance and my honor; my mighty rock, my refuge is in God.
- 62:8 Trust in him at all times, O people; pour out your heart before him; God is a refuge for us. Selah
- Those of low estate are but a breath, those of high estate are a delusion; in the balances they go up; they are together lighter than a breath.
- 62:10 Put no confidence in extortion, and set no vain hopes on robbery; if riches increase, do not set your heart on them.
- 62:11 Once God has spoken; twice have I heard this: that power belongs to God,

- 7:29 I mean, brothers and sisters, the appointed time has grown short; from now on, let even those who have wives be as though they had none,
- 7:30 and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no possessions,
- 7:31 and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.

Mark 1:14-20 (Please stand for the Gospel)

- 1:14 Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God,
- 1:15 and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."
- 1:16 As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea--for they were fishermen.
- 1:17 And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people."
- 1:18 And immediately they left their nets and followed him.

- 1:19 As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets.
- 1:20 Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

L: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

P: Thanks be to God!

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor. (Let us offer our silent confessions.)

We listen to the stories of the call of the disciples and find them interesting but unrealistic. When we look at our own lives, we believe that we could not leave everything to follow someone we didn't know. We have many responsibilities and ties which keep us from following. But God is persistent. God understands our confusion and doubts. And God continues to call us to be in ministry and mission in this world. It may not mean leaving everything behind, but it does mean being willing to serve wherever God calls us. That's hard. We want to place conditions on service, and usually those conditions are "if we have time", "if we have energy"; " if we can just try serving God for a little while to see how it all works out". Still God calls to each of us. Discipleship is difficult. Forgive us, patient and persistent Lord, for the very many times we turn our backs on serving you and focus on our own comforts. Forgive us when we look the other way when people are in need. Forgive us our angry attitudes and actions which hurt rather than heal. Wrap your arms around us, healing our wounds, binding us to you. Gently move us into service in your name. AMEN.
