Dear Lake Toxaway UMC family and friends,

My pastoral letter this week is an example of a devotional I have written in response to the Gospel lesson. I want to offer an example using a format I will suggest in an announcement. I pray daily for all of you and the special needs we all carry in our hearts!

Scripture Reading: Mark 1:21-28

1:24: And he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God."

I grew up in a home with a mother who suffered from a terrible mental illness. More importantly, I grew up in a family of deep faith in a God who was ultimate in power and authority. I never remember a time when we were not praying for my mother's healing and restoration.

In the 1960s and 1970s, many people held interesting theological understandings of mental illness. I remember some Christians telling us my mother was demon possessed. There was a tragic event in church where she interrupted a worship service and a horrifying scene erupted. What I remember most other than the usual embarrassment was the kind and loving response of our church community who followed the lead of the minister and went into prayer with the organ and piano quietly playing in the background as several individuals came to help my father get my mother to a hospital.

Biblical stories of individuals possessed with demons are often understood and interrupted as stories of people suffering with mental illness. I think this is one interruption. I also have come to know there are demonic forces in the world. Rather than wanting a "right interpretation," I hear the powerful words of a man who was ill saying, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?"

The question is answered with healing! My mother never received a miraculous healing, but God worked in her illness and led each of my siblings to a deep faith in God's constant presence with us. We learned to let go of our fears about her illness, to surrender ourselves to God's transforming power in Christ in the redeeming work of our lives as we lived with her illness and loved her. That was a healing story for children in our generation!

Prayer: Lord, surround individuals and families who deal with mental illness. Bless those professionals who work with these individuals and families. May they all find strength, guidance and ultimate healing in Christ Jesus. Amen.

I gladly serve among you. I am praying you will volunteer to write a devotional during lent!

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Deuteronomy 18:15-20

- 18:15 The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet.
- 18:16 This is what you requested of the LORD your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the LORD my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die."
- 18:17 Then the LORD replied to me: "They are right in what they have said.
- 18:18 I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command.
- 18:19 Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable.
- 18:20 But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak--that prophet shall die."

Psalm 111 (Please read responsively the text in bold)

- Praise the LORD! I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart, in the company of the upright, in the congregation.
- 111:2 Great are the works of the LORD, studied by all who delight in them.
- 111:3 Full of honor and majesty is his work, and his righteousness endures forever.
- 111:4 He has gained renown by his wonderful deeds; the LORD is gracious and merciful.
- He provides food for those who fear him; he is ever mindful of his covenant.
- He has shown his people the power of his works, in giving them the heritage of the nations.
- 111:7 The works of his hands are faithful and just; all his precepts are trustworthy.
- 111:8 They are established forever and ever, to be performed with faithfulness and uprightness.
- He sent redemption to his people; he has commanded his covenant forever. Holy and awesome is his name.
- 111:10 The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom; all those who practice it have a good understanding. His praise endures forever.

1 Corinthians 8:1-13

- 8:1 Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up.
- 8:2 Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge;
- 8:3 but anyone who loves God is known by him.
- 8:4 Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one."
- 8:5 Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth--as in fact there are many gods and many lords--
- yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.
- 8:7 It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled.
- 8:8 "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do.
- 8:9 But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak.
- 8:10 For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols?
- 8:11 So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed.
- 8:12 But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ.
- 8:13 Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

Mark 1:21-28 (Please stand for the Gospel)

- 1:21 They went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught.
- 1:22 They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes.
- 1:23 Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit,
- 1:24 and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God."
- 1:25 But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!"
- 1:26 And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him.

- 1:27 They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching--with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him."
- 1:28 At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

Lenten Devotional Writers Wanted! Request from Pastor Marcus WE NEED 40 VOLUNTEERS FOR THE 40 DAYS OF LENT!

First, here is a tutorial on writing a devotional:

- 1) Chose a scripture passage or ask to have one assigned. Here is an example: 1 John 4: 7-21. You list that as the reading for the day.
- 2) Chose a phrase or word that is speaking to you in the text. If I were writing a devotional, I might focus on verse 7: "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is form God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God." Share a personal story of why this passage speaks to you. I might write a story about the love of special people in the Christian communities where I have lived and how their love has helped to shape me into the person I am. Others might write a poem or tell a recent story of how God has worked in your life.
- 3) Conclude your devotional with a brief prayer that you write. (If your devotional was about one of your parents, you might write a prayer for parents who are engaged in the important work of raising children today.)

(My pastoral letter this Sunday is an example of a devotional utilizing this format. You might choose to write a poem, hymn, etc.)

Administrative Council Meeting


