

Lake Toxanvay United Methodist Church Sunday, March 7th, 2021

Dear Lake Toxaway family and friends,

The Old Testament lesson this week is a reading of the Ten Commandments. I will confess to you preaching from a list of laws can be as equivalent and exciting for me as preaching from genealogy. (I hope a few of you understand my humor.) I do not want anyone to hear me as one who has a pointing, shaking finger in your face as we consider these Laws from God for His people. I also do not want to re-hash things you already know. So, I invite us to consider how these Commandments describe the Kingdom of God.

To many church folks, these words are simply a base level from which we build a better sense of law and order or a greater responsibility for working beside the Spirit to build eternity that God has envisioned for us. What do all these words have to do with life and death and covenant and commitment, with promises and community?

These laws are about drawing lines. Yes, I said lines: boundary lines. We talk about life and death when we gather for a funeral or memorial service. We reflect on the weaving of a covenant when we stand before the altar and perform a wedding. We re-define family when we welcome new members taking a commitment to live and learn among us. We are stretching the circle around a table of sacrifice and grace when we will cease our fast and gather for the sacrament of Communion. We are drawing lines.

The problem is we usually see "lines" as a negative. For many, drawing lines is about limitation; right and wrong, in and out. Some people will complain and state, "don't fence me in" or "don't cramp my style." Drawing lines goes against our value of freedom. I continue to see bumper stickers and embroidery with "no limits." These are not just a slogan; these words are how we define ourselves and how we understand ourselves.

Yet in our rational minds, we know boundaries and rules are good things. And that is why we reluctantly accept them. Like a child who wants to play late into the night but trudges up to bed anyway, we say that the lines are good for us... like broccoli or beets.

Sometimes we find the Ten Commandments, these rules, well limiting. We suppose it is for our own good. Is God a God to bring the whole nation of Israel out into the wilderness for a divine "time out." Is this conversation started with a way of the divine finger and a slow shake of the holy head, displaying disappointment and a prelude to punishment? Are the people being grounded by these words? Restricted? Chastened? Reproved?

Or is there something else going on here? What if we took a different approach to the "lines?" What if we hear them not as limitations but as definitions? What if we looked at this moment in the history of the people of God not as punishment for less than stellar behavior, but as gift because of a greater than imagined love?

certainly, there are boundaries in the covenant of marriage, but who would call them punishment? Instead, it is a new way of being, a new way of living and loving. We are redefined when we make that commitment to love and to cherish. We make promises that do not constrain us so much as set us free to love. We are not hampered by the lines drawn so much as we are encouraged to go deeper and higher, to love more profoundly.

Baptism and confirmation are about making vows to love as well. The lines that are drawn are about finding your way into the fellowship and family of the Church. It is about making a commitment to serve and to participate and gather with the community of faith. It is about claiming that in this journey that is life and faith, we acknowledge we need support; we need companionship; we need a community to surround us as we make our pilgrim way

The Ten Commandments are not so much commandments we ought to follow reluctantly or not, as they are descriptions of the kind of people we can choose to be by the power of the Holy Spirit. The people who love God (Commandments 1-4) and who love neighbor (Commandments 5-10). My Hebrew theology professor said we should re-translate them not as "Thou shall" or Thou shall not" but as "You are the people who have one God" and "You are not the people who kill, steal, and bear false witness." This is who we Christians are and who we are not. God did not say, "jump through these hoops and I will love you." Instead, God says, "My love for you will shape you into these kinds of people, this kind of community.

These words are a description of the kingdom of God! How long? Into eternity! God draws lines at a funeral, the lines of welcome into the heavenly home. And what we thought was a line, the line dividing life and death, was only a doorway, only a corner to turn, which brings us into a new reality. The lines of God's people define us here and there! God announces where the lines are for us to live well now, but also so we will be at home in eternity with God. We go on living the lines God has drawn, now and in eternity. All these words draw a picture that sees beyond our vision. May it be so. Thanks be to God!

Yes, I know, you can call this a sermon and I jokingly give you a pass to take a nap during the sermon this week. Please know how frequently I pray for you (authors of devotionals are a special focus of my prayers on the days your devotional is published). "The boundary lines have fallen for me in pleasant places as I serve among you and at the hospital. I cherish each of you as my special family of God!

- I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery;
- 20:3 you shall have no other gods before me.
- You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth.
- 20:5 You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me,
- but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.
- 20:7 You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.
- 20:8 Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy.
- 20:9 Six days you shall labor and do all your work.

- 20:14 You shall not commit adultery.

- 20:15 You shall not steal.
- 20:16 You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 20:17 You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

Psalm 19 (Please read the bold text responsively)

- 19:1 The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork.
- 19:2 Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge.
- 19:3 There is no speech, nor are there words; their voice is not heard;
- 19:4 yet their voice goes out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world. In the heavens he has set a tent for the sun,
- which comes out like a bridegroom from his wedding canopy, and like a strong man runs its course with joy.
- 19:6 Its rising is from the end of the heavens, and its circuit to the end of them; and nothing is hid from its heat.
- 19:7 The law of the LORD is perfect, reviving the soul; the decrees of the LORD are sure, making wise the simple;
- 19:8 the precepts of the LORD are right, rejoicing the heart; the commandment of the LORD is clear, enlightening the eyes;
- the fear of the LORD is pure, enduring forever; the ordinances of the LORD are true and righteous altogether.
- 19:10 More to be desired are they than gold, even much fine gold; sweeter also than honey, and drippings of the honeycomb.
- 19:11 Moreover by them is your servant warned; in keeping them there is great reward.
- 19:12 But who can detect their errors? Clear me from hidden faults.
- 19:13 Keep back your servant also from the insolent; do not let them have dominion over me. Then I shall be blameless, and innocent of great transgression.
- 19:14 Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer.

1 Corinthians 1:18-25

- 1:18 For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.
- 1:19 For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."
- 1:20 Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?
- 1:21 For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe.

John 2:13-22 (Please stand for the Gospel)

- 2:13 The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem.
- 2:14 In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables.
- 2:15 Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables.
- 2:16 He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!"
- 2:17 His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me."
- 2:18 The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?"
- 2:19 Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up."
- 2:20 The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?"

- 2:21 But he was speaking of the temple of his body.
- 2:22 After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

L: This is the word of the Lord for the people of Christ.

P: Thanks be to God.
