Dear Lake Toxaway family and friends,

The Gospel lesson leaves Mark this week and goes to John. During this year of the lectionary, when Mark's Gospel is primary, there are frequent substitutions to the Gospel of John. There are a couple of reasons for this movement to John's Gospel: 1) Mark is a short Gospel and 2) The lectionary is a three-year cycle with Matthew, Mark and Luke highlighted as the Gospel reading in each year. Therefore, during the year of Mark's Gospel, we have many opportunities to read from John's Gospel. Most church scholars indicate John's Gospel was written later than Matthew, Mark and Luke; they highlight its rich focus on symbolism, "I AM" statements and other literary devices found in John's Gospel.

With this brief education about the organization of the lectionary and John's Gospel, I find it ironic how our lesson today is one to which many of us can relate easily. The resurrection of Jesus was and is a difficult tenet of our faith to believe. Thomas, one of Jesus' twelve disciples, is full of doubt. Jesus had appeared to the other disciples, but Thomas had not been in the room to see the risen Christ. When the disciples tell Thomas of Christ's appearance to them, he says: "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

I often think the words, "I'll believe it when I see it." We have other expressions that communicate this same thought such as "the proof is in the pudding."

Did Thomas question his friends because he lacked faith or was it because he longed to deepen his faith in and understanding of the Risen Christ? It may have been a little of both. For us to believe in something, questioning is both a natural and often necessary part of developing our belief system. Doubt exists as an inescapable and necessary part of our human existence. If we move to the extreme in doubt, we become cynical and blind to any reality beyond the physical. However, to have no sense of skepticism allows us to be swayed by unrealistic promises and led astray by deals too good to be true (the Bible warns of following false teaching and teachers). Doubt can lead us to question, to reflect, to understand the reality at a deeper level. Faith is not so much the opposite of doubt as it is flowering of our understanding, our recognition of a mystery unfolding before us. If doubt is as much a part of us as sin, faith is the gift and grace we receive in baptism. It is not the end of all questioning. It is the peace that fills our hearts when we rest in God's presence!

Jesus appears to the disciple a week later and Thomas is present. Jesus lovingly turns to Thomas and offers the opportunity for him to fulfill his previous statement. Thomas then answers Jesus, "My Lord and my God!" Thomas had a deep revelation at that moment, knowing fully and completely Jesus Christ was the Risen Lord. But what about us? We have not had this opportunity, but we are invited to believe not based on what we have seen, but on what Jesus places on our hearts as truth. And Jesus says to Thomas and says to all believers throughout time: "have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Doubt is a natural emotion; one God knew we would all experience. But when we sit quietly with the Lord, wholeheartedly asking our tough questions and allowing Him to respond, our faith can and will blossom into a beautiful relationship of trust and deeper understanding of God's love for us. May we sit quietly with the Lord in our areas of life's doubts. May we find we can ask tough questions. And may we allow His grace to give us clarity and insight, eliminating our doubts. I pray we find ourselves able to lay our doubts and fears at the foot of the cross!

SCRIPTURE READINGS

***Acts 4:32-35** * During Eastertide a reading from Acts is often substituted for the lesson from the Hebrew Bible.

- 4:32 Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common.
- 4:33 With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all.
- 4:34 There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold.
- 4:35 They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need.

Psalm 133 (Please read responsively the bold text.)

133:1 How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity!

133:2 It is like the precious oil on the head, running down upon the beard, on the beard of Aaron, running down over the collar of his robes.

133:3 It is like the dew of Hermon, which falls on the mountains of Zion. For there the LORD ordained his blessing, life forevermore.

1 John 1:1-2:2

- 1:1 We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life--
- 1:2 this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us--
- 1:3 we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ.
- 1:4 We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.
- 1:5 This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all.
- 1:6 If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true;

- 1:7 but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.
- 1:8 If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.
- 1:9 If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.
- 1:10 If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.
- 2:1 My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous;
- 2:2 and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

John 20:19-31 (Please stand for the Gospel reading.)

- 20:19 When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you."
- 20:20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.
- 20:21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."
- 20:22 When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit.
- 20:23 If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."
- 20:24 But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came.
- 20:25 So, the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."
- 20:26 A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you."
- 20:27 Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe."

- 20:28 Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!"
- 20:29 Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."
- 20:30 Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book.
- 20:31 But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.
- L: This is the word of the Lord for the people of Christ.

P: Thanks be to God.
