... the LORD answered Job, and said: "Shall the one who contends with the Almighty correct Him? He who rebukes God, let him answer it."

..." Now prepare yourself like a man; I will question you, and you shall answer Me: Would you indeed annul My judgment? Would you condemn Me that you may be justified?"

Last August, my sister, standing in her bedroom, shot her rescued dog and then lay down on her bed, turned the gun on herself, and they died.

I was stunned, horrified, and angry. I tried to figure out why. I wanted to understand. Was her chronic pain and psychological suffering the motivation for this sickening act? Was the call of death to her a temptation? Was God calling her home?

When horrible things happen, I ask God how could this be? I do not understand, and I object to God not answering my questions. How could this be God's will? And if it is God's will, how can I be reconciled to it? Should I contend with the Almighty to answer me and condemn God for not doing so? My anger tempts me to turn away from God and renounce God's love.

Lent is a time to reflect on what tempts us and how like Jesus we can live not on what tempts us, but by the word of God. I do not understand things. I get angry at God. Then I pray not for understanding, but God's comfort. Should I accept the wisdom of the song there will be an answer and Let It Be? Maybe there will not be an answer. Like Job, I am humbled. I realize my limitations and cannot understand our unlimited God and so, I am marked with ashes.

*Prayer:* Lord help us to be like Mary. Let us be your servants and let it be according to your word. *Adapted from Luke 1:38.*
